FROM THE MINISTER



This year, we continue to see a number of successes from the outcomes of our away day in the Autumn of 2003 but we have also faced a number of challenges in the life of our church. Some of the people who have contributed greatly to our church life have, for various reasons, needed to step back and we have all felt their absence. Before I write anything else I would like to take this

opportunity to thank them all for their contributions to our church community. In some cases, new volunteers have come forward and I would also like to give thanks to, and for them in their new roles. However, the loss of some long-standing volunteers has inevitably posed challenges to both individuals and to the church. I hope that the one of the lessons we can take from the past year is the need for us to seek to be more resilient in all areas of our church life. We must try to find ways of not becoming so dependent on particular individuals, however skilled those individuals might be. To help us to achieve this, the Stewards and the Church Council have been looking at all areas of our church life, both spiritual and physical, and looking to find how to make meeting these needs both more sustainable and less daunting. It is right that the Stewards and the Church Council should lead us in this but I hope that everyone understands that it is not a task just for them. For this church to flourish, everyone needs to play their part. We are all different and what part you are called to play is something to be prayerfully discerned but we can be certain that God calls each of us to be a part of the building of his Kingdom through his Church. WORSHIP

The pattern of worship at Wesley and King's Somborne chapels have continued to follow our established pattern over the past year. At the request of the Church Council, a Worship Consultation was convened to review current worship patterns and to begin discussions about possible changes to our future worship.

This consultation concluded that our Sunday worship generally meets the requirements of those who attend it and it is important that any changes should not negatively affect those already attending. However, it is also recognised that, if the church is to have a future as a place of worship, then it is essential that we take steps to attract new worshipers, and hopefully new Christians, to join us. The consultation noted, "On appearance the congregation is very elderly and frail. This is not necessarily attractive to younger people with children. We may have to consider various alternatives to worship on the Sunday morning. Some alternatives were discussed and ideas shared ... We need to question what it is that would attract people to worship." This would necessarily include evaluation and review of our other worship activities including Messy Church, Lego Church and community services.

The consultation also recommended to the Church Council that it establish and on-going "Worship and Fellowship Focus Group" in order to explore and monitor the worshipping life of the church

The Church Council received the report of the Worship Consultation and endorsed its recommendations.

OUTREACH

Outreach activities have continued to be how Wesley and the Church family interact with those around us as we share our faith through many ways. Although the numbers were low, (partially due to the cold conditions) those that attended enjoyed hospitality and the sharing of the Christmas Story. The lights were fantastic and a special thank you must go to Aden Craig for his expertise, ideas and time, thank you! The Advent Lights were such a success that Aden suggested a light show during Lent and this was well received and commented upon by the local community.

The various services during Advent brought many new faces into Wesley. A particular highlight was the Community Carols, where engagement with the local Winchester MP and the Mayor of Winchester, encapsulated the forging of community links and the benefit this brings to all.

As we look forward, both Wesley and King's Somborne will continue with those outreach activities that are working so well, but we will also explore new and exciting opportunities to share our faith through our interaction, conversation and hospitality. PROPERTY

Wesley are blessed in the fact that the building is in good repair and we have a whole team of people doing their part to present a building which is conducive to worship and outreach to a whole range of people in our community. i.e. maintenance, gardening, housekeeping, catering details, posters outside and flowers in church.well. The Property group are overseeing all this work to ensure we are all safe and sound when we use the building. The Boiler caused us problems in 2024 but we have been able to produce a plan! Firstly we ensured that the boiler was likely to last for 5 years and now we are in the process of updating controls to be as efficient as possible. Church Council also ring fenced in our Church Reserves a sum of money to replace the boiler when necessary.

The regular cleaning of the building is expensive but also essential if we are to provide a healthy, safe and secure building for people to use every day of the week. The surrounds of the church are wonderful gardens and the Garden Team do a superb work. This year at Christmas and the Advent of Spring the illuminations in the trees and bushes were much appreciated thanks to helpful and generous people. The inside of the building continues to improve.

The recent installation of the large TV screens and other equipment all given generously by people in the church have enhanced worship in the building and those who worship at home on the live stream. Wesley is very blessed in this way of providing up to date systems to enable us all to worship God. Next years report will give details of the work being done this summer.

MULTIMEDIA

After a long period of thought and enquiry this was the year when a major upgrade of Wesley's multimedia systems has been planned and partially completed. The following are the main considerations which have guided our planning:

- The large centrally located screen was recognised by many to be uncomfortable to view from the front rows of seats and the only solution was recognised to be mounting lower screens on both sides.
- At certain times of the year sunlight would fall through the roof windows, sometimes obliterating the material on the high screen
- Although the projector is a very powerful one the image on the screen was relatively dull compared with that provided by modern TV type screens.
- It was highly desirable that the two operators (program content and live-stream) should be seated next to each other and they should both be seated higher to see over the congregation's heads.
- The control desk had long since become inadequate to contain two seated operators, an advisor's seat and the necessary equipment. A new desk design now exists and installation will take place shortly.

- An upgrade from an analogue to a digital audio board will provide a number of improvements. These will include new facilities and superior control, also with potential for improvement in sound quality.
- The digital board, together with limited access to the inside of the desk, will provide much needed security. This would not only protect our assets but will provide defence against the 'unknown knob-twiddlers'.
- There is a need for casual users with relatively simple requirements to be able to access facilities for sound and vision without the services of a member of the multimedia team.

The work is in two major phases. The first phase was completed on 15th December 2024 and this provided the new screens and all the upgraded wiring from them to the new desk position. The second phase, which is much more complex technically, will commence in early July 2025. The equipment is currently being assembled in the supplier's premises.

We have had another encouraging year here at King's Somborne with several of our outreach people coming to some of our services.

Attendance to Sunday Services

Numbers in the congregation can vary, anything from 2 to 10 people. Special occasions have been well attended such as the Advent Carol Service with a congregation of 36 and this year we hosted the World Day of Prayer which was written by the women of the Cook Islands. It was a particularly good, thought provoking service, followed by tea and was attended by about 20 people. Our Good Friday service, followed by tea, had a congregation of 30. Once again, this was a very special time for us to gather together and remember Jesus' death on the cross.

Drop In coffee mornings

These continue to be popular and we can have any number up to 24. There's always lots of chat and people enjoy coming for the company and the happy atmosphere. Since the last annual report, we have celebrated two 80th birthdays where each family has treated us all to a wonderful selection of savoury and sweet food. We have been able to give money to various charities again, including £100 to the Leprosy Mission, £50 to MHA and £50 to the Countess of Brecknock.

Epworth Lunches

These continue to be popular. We cater for 24 diners and have an excellent team of helpers who enable the occasion to run smoothly. We continue to be very grateful to a team of very good cooks who kindly take turns to provide the meals. The quizzes at the end of the meal are enjoyed and can be quite competitive! The charities we have supported over the year have been Guide Dogs for the Blind, BOAZ, Andover Food Bank, Countess of Brecknock and Jane Scarth, raising a total of £796 for them from our charity tin. All these charities are local to us. Once again, for our annual inspection, we received a 5 star award for hygiene.

Women's Fellowship

We have a possible 20 ladies attend our Women's Fellowship, depending on their availability and the subject matter! Once again we have had a varied programme with some open meetings where we invite anyone to join us. On May 28th, we shall be having such a meeting when a representative from the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance will be coming to speak to us. This talk will be followed on Saturday 7th June, by a sale to raise more money for its worthy cause. In June of last year, we had a sale for Guide Dogs for the Blind, following an excellent talk from a representative. On this occasion, including donations, we raised a total of £900.

Messy Church

Messy Church continues to cater for approximately 30 people, including adults and children. The leaders of the activities consist of Anglicans and Methodists. Two young people who were members of Messy Church and who became Junior Leaders had to stop helping us due to pressure of school work and exams. Josie is sitting her GCSEs as we write and we wish her well! The activities are well prepared and organised and a write up about the afternoon appears in our village Gauntlet magazine.

The year-on-year Circuit Assessment increase continued the trend, a situation that requires increase in receipts which is currently diminishing. Deficit net receipts do not reflect as negative bank account balance but are accruals. Funding for such expenditures is obtained through arranging withdrawals from Central Finance Board.

The marginal decrease in utilities expenditure is a trend that is being pursued by the Property Group through various initiatives that also seek to lower Repairs and Maintenance expenditure. This is an endeavour to keep regular giving and offering, which had been the main source of receipts, sufficient to service expected payments. Looking into the future, the Finance and Property Working Group is encouraging the membership to make donations, a means of receipt that had no contribution in the year under review, a departure from previous years. Please receive the report and may God stir appropriate response in our hearts.
